HISTORY COMMITTEE UPDATE

On March 18, please pause for a moment and reflect on the fact, that on this day 120 years ago the Lutheran people of Webster and surrounding areas heard their first service by Pastor Schumm. The Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, as we know it, would not be organized until June 18, 1890. This was Pastor Schumm's first service for us and he went on to serve us for ten years. During the subsequent 120 years, this congregation has had many occasions to celebrate, some periods of great disappointment, and many difficult challenges, but the important thing to remember is that we are still here and are moving forward.

In the January newsletter, I made a query as to the identity of an M. Johnson who had loaned a historic photo to a local newspaper in 1990. One of the responses I received was a phone call from Robert Langer in Florida. He indicated that the M. Johnson was his aunt, Margarethe Johnson, she resides in a nursing home in Connecticut and is approaching her 100th birthday. Margarethe verified she did still have some early photos of the church but they are presently in storage. Robert talked to me additionally about Emanuel Church and "Lutherwood", which I did not have any knowledge of. He told me to contact Margaret Heide and Doris Manzi as their parents were caretakers of Lutherwood.

My plea for the month once again involves the safe in the boiler room that was brought here from the original church. Does anyone have what they believe might be the combination for this safe? It may help, even though the safe has been vandalized, if we have to get the help of professional.

HISTORICAL ITEMS RECEIVED

We have received a beautiful German Bible from Esther Elliott. It is leather bound with gold lettering and decoration. It was a gift to her from her father Hermann Fuchs and is dated 1909. Milton Schremser sent us copies of a selection of photos, from his sister Evelyn (Schremser) Breikreitz. They include a Confirmation Class photo for 1941, a post card view of the original Zion Church on Lincoln Street and a group of snapshots of the Young Peoples Society taken in 1941-1942. Some of these were taken at Crescent Park. Conrad Redlitz told me that Crescent Park was a family oriented amusement park in Rhode Island.

LUTHERWOOD

On September 5, 1943, Textile Lodge, formerly Indian Inn and Webster Lake Hotel, at Colonial Park, was purchased by the Massachusetts CIO as a recreation center. The CIO utilized the property for less than three years. On May 22, 1946 negotiations were completed for the sale of the same Textile Lodge to the Lutheran Conferences for use as a summer Bible School. The Lutheran Conference was part of the Augustana Synod, New England Conference. The new name for the facility was "Lutherwood". It was located on a neck of land at the very southern end of Webster Lake, in an area known as Colonial Park. The driveway was only accessible from a road from across the state line in Connecticut.

It became a year round operation, with most activities during the better weather, from 1946 until about 1959. About 1959 it was sold to Webster Academy (boys school), it lasted about 3 years before being destroyed by fire. "Lutherwood", served all churches, but during periods of heavy demand for usage the Lutheran churches got priority.

From 1951 until 1959, Emil W. Anderson along with his wife Emma were the overseers and caretakers of the facility. During this time the Andersons resided here. Two of the Anderson daughters provided some of these recollections, they are Margaret (Anderson) Heide and Doris (Anderson) Manzi.

The reason the Lutheran Conference gave up this property was because of it's location, it could not be enlarged, and the demand continued to grow. The result was the purchase of a farm in New Hampshire which went on to become "Calumet"

Anyone with additional information on the subject is requested to please pass it along to me for inclusion in our files.

As a result of the discussion on Lutherwood, Margaret Heide provided the history archive with a selection of copies of photos of the facility and her family living there.

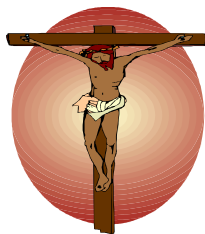
